

#### **CONCEPT NOTES:**

Every society has its unique way of recording history through writing. Manuscripts are a vital component of the intangible cultural heritage of any community or nation. They represent the ancient practices of writing, showcasing the rich traditions of intellectuality before the era of literary print culture. In the realm of history, manuscripts are classified as primary sources, helping us unearth various facets of a cultural past. As rightly stated, "a truly great work of history will be rooted in primary authorities." Manuscripts are the raw materials, the firsthand written documents, which might not initially appear meaningful to the layperson. Hence, they require the art and skill of reading and handling primary sources like manuscripts to transform them into coherent and intelligible sources.

The manuscripts of Assam are abundant in both quantity and quality. There is a compelling need to delve into the history of Assamese manuscripts. When discussing the medieval manuscripts of Assam, they served as the medium for Neo-Vaishnavism, representing a treasure trove of Assamese literature. Depending on the writing materials/carriers, Assamese manuscripts are categorized as Sanchipat Manuscripts, Tulapat Manuscripts, bamboo-strip manuscripts, palm-leaf manuscripts, etc. The entire process of creating and preparing manuscripts reflects the significance of the traditional knowledge systems of indigenous people. Recent scientific studies on Sanchipat manuscripts of Assam reveal their remarkable resilience despite environmental constraints.

Therefore, this workshop aims to raise awareness among academicians, research scholars, and students regarding the importance of manuscripts in the context of medieval Assam. It earnestly endeavors to highlight the art and skill required for reading manuscripts and explores the problems and challenges associated with preserving manuscripts in Assam, particularly in the context of recent initiatives for digital preservation.
